

**Note:** The houses in Chester Road, Queen's Road and the section of Essex Road in between do not currently fall within the area of Westgate-on-Sea Town Council although they all fall within the Westgate-on-Sea (South) Conservation Area. These houses constitute a very important part of 'old Westgate' and, until the early 2000s (when there was a change of TDC's Ward boundaries following a review by the Boundary Commission), were contained within the Westgate-on-Sea Ward boundary.

The houses in these roads are a mix of two-and-three storey dwellings and were predominantly occupied by artisans and their families employed by Lockwood's and William Frostrick, two of Westgate's largest building firms established in the heart of 'old Westgate'.

Similarly, Nos. 1, 3, 5 & 7 Canterbury Road (built by Lockwood's) and Nos. 15, 17, 19, 21, 23 and 25 Canterbury Road are no longer within the area of Westgate-on-Sea Town Council. Nevertheless, these houses together with The West Gate Nursing Home (formerly The Hockeredge) have also been included in the above list because they once were included in Westgate-on-Sea at its extreme eastern boundary of the town.
