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### Be Aware, Show You Care! Reduce your Speed!!

Westgate on Sea Town Council has been pleased to see the positive effects from the running of their Speedwatch Programme, at the end of 2018 stats showed that 17% of all drivers monitored were driving above 35mph in 30mph areas, the latest figures show that this number has dropped to 12%.

Speeding has been a continuous concern for the residents of Westgate on Sea. Our wide residential roads have often encouraged dangerous driving and thoughtless parking. which can and has led to accidents, injuries and unfortunately even loss of life. The Speedwatch initiative was set-up to help raise the awareness of careless driving on residential roads that hold a high risk of potential accidents and fatalities. Co-ordinated by Cllr Matthew Scott and our Town Clerk Gill Gray, the initiative works in connection with Kent Police and has been running since October 2018 with a growing team of volunteers which run sessions in various local locations at varying times of the day.

#### So what is Speedwatch?

Speedwatch schemes help community volunteers reduce excessive speeds on local roads. Operating at the roadside in 20mph, 30mph and 40mph areas, volunteers monitor speeds using a speed indication device (SID).

The owners of vehicles who have been repeatedly seen speeding or have been recorded at more than 50% over the limit are sent a letter of advice. Speedwatch activity never directly leads to prosecutions or penalties however officers may visit the registered owner's address in cases of repeat offenders.

The scheme main aims are:

- Increase drivers' perception of the risks from speeding and encourage them to slow down
- Reduce collisions and the severity of injuries on local roads
- Improve the quality of life for local communities.

As an active volunteer Cllr Matthew Scott has seen the positive reception and support from passing pedestrians, cyclists and even other motorists:



Cllr M.Scott "Having seen improvement in such a short period of time is very encouraging, however there is still a long way to go, we note that a large proportion of drivers slow down when seeing Speedwatch in location and we need these drivers to realise that speeding causes loss of lives and drivers should be driving within the speed limits at all times. Speedwatch is not there to 'catch people out', but to make road users aware of their speed and therefore continue to make Westgate on Sea's residential roads safer."

Cllr Scott also states the increasing need for more volunteers is essential for the growth and momentum of the Programme. "We want to run Speedwatch sessions more often and in more locations and as such need additional volunteers, after training the commitment is only one hour per month which is a small amount of time with big benefits for all of the community."

### Westgate Housing

The Westgate-on-Sea Town Council and residents of Westgate-on-Sea have been vehemently against the allocation of 1000 houses on top quality agricultural land in and adjacent to the town, which has recently been increased to 2000 houses due to the reallocation of houses intended for the Manston Airport site.

The Town Council believes that some houses should be built, especially affordable and family houses as well as housing for older people to downsize to. However, 1000 houses are too many for the area and 2000 is complete over development of the town.

The Town Council also believes that the planned 17,100 houses for Thanet to 2031, corresponding to over 1000 houses per year, is massive overdevelopment and will cause great pressures on the infrastructure of the area, which is already over stretched e.g. The QEQM, doctors surgeries and our road system. Well over 8000 of these houses are planned for agricultural land classed as excellent (grade 1) and very good (grade 2) which is know as the "best and most versatile agricultural land" in the UK. The Town Council believes that high quality agricultural land should be preserved for growing food, especially at a time when the future of importing food from other countries is uncertain due to climate change.

The Town Council set up a Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, chaired by Cllr Dr Hannah Scott, and asked the residents their views on the new proposed development. The majority of residents were extremely upset about the proposed destruction of the farmland and many did not want any of the land used for housing, stating that we should use brownfield land instead. Also residents said that if some housing did have to go ahead then the numbers should be limited and developers should build them in a way that does not encroach right up to existing residents, the development should include all the necessary infrastructure (doctors, dentists, roads) along with green spaces throughout, with respect to nature.

During the summer months, the Town Council will ask residents to read and comment on the Westgate-on-Sea Neighbourhood Plan that they have written. The are very proud of the



Neighbourhood Plan as it showcases the area and, although it cannot completely stop the current housing allocation, it aims to get the best development possible and also protect the town from over development in the future. The Town Council hope that everyone will get involved in the consultation.

It looks like Westgate-on-Sea and Garlinge will have up to 2000 houses built next to them and the law - the National Planning Policy Framework - allows the destruction of farmland.

The law states that if farmland has to be built on within a Local Plan to fulfil the housing need of the area, that lower quality land should be used first. This is where the problem lies - the majority is excellent and very good farmland - showing that the framework is not fit for purpose in Thanet. At the Local Plan hearing in public Cllr Dr Scott raised these issues however was told that the hearing was not the place to guestion the National Planning Policy Framework.

The Town Council will continue to fight this allocation and are adamant that the 1000 houses that were put onto Westgate from Manston should be put back onto the Manston site if it is reallocated as housing again - brownfield land should be used before agricultural land.

In the meantime, as some houses will inevitably be built, the Neighbourhood Plan Steering

Group will continue to talk to Millwood Homes (developers of the Westgate site) to try to get the best possible development for the area, with good design, open spaces, all vital infrastructure included and respect for the existing residents. Millwood Homes intend to consult the local residents in the autumn and the Town Council will keep the residents informed of this. The Town Council will now begin to look at ways to take our concerns higher and to change the law on building on agricultural land.

This level of destruction of best and most versatile agricultural land cannot continue otherwise Westgate and the whole of Thanet will be concreted over in the future.

Cllr Dr Scott will be speaking at the Local Plan hearing in public on the environment and climate change on Wednesday 10th July, Austen Room, TDC offices.

### **Meet the Designer**

### How long have you been a designer and what got you into designing?

I've worked as a commercial graphic designer for 18 years but before that trained as a pattern designer and screen printer so have always loved being creative. In fact most of my early memories involve me painting or drawing. I guess I fell in to graphic design as it was a sustainable creative career but I love the fact it allows me to build relationships with all sorts of different people and industries through working with them.

### What has been your most challenging project?

After spending 17 years securely employed, in the Midlands and London, I've now set up on my own which allows me the freedom to go back to my roots and combine my commercial design work with illustration and print. Projects can be individually challenging but that's part of the fun - finding a way through the fog. I think setting up as a freelancer in Thanet and building my business from scratch has been a huge challenge and one I'm very proud to say is working so far.

### How did you come up with the idea for the Westgate Day design?

I met with members of the Town Council and we discussed the Town and the event at length. We identified 4 key characteristics of the town which informed the colours - the sea - blue, sand - yellow, green spaces - green and the railway - red. Then I took the 4 areas which Westgate Day is focused on - heritage, creativity, coastal beauty and literary talent. I came up with the oblong motif from a section of the W in Westgate, and used it to create a celebratory bang of confetti for the logo. But the confetti could also be the Town's historic buildings, paint splashed on a canvas, our coastal flora or words on a page.

# £10,000 grant from The National Lottery Community Fund

Almost £88 million of National Lottery funding has been awarded to over 3,000 projects across England this quarter. The good news comes ahead of Loneliness Awareness Week (17 – 21 June), an annual event dedicated to raising awareness of loneliness and helping reduce the stigma.

The funding has gone to support many different groups and projects taking innovative approaches to tackling loneliness and isolation, amongst other things. Recipients all share one thing in common – they understand what's needed in their communities and are focused on bringing people together to improve lives and provide support.

In Bloom by Westgate-on-Sea Town Council will use the £10,000 awarded to start a project of beautification to the Town, this will include the planting of new trees, flower beds, eat and grow gardens, wildlife areas plus raised beds for easy planting by our older residents. In addition, we will place new seating around the town for residents to be able to take in the views of our blue flag beaches and historic landmarks. We hope the beautification project will leave a legacy for future generations, bring together people of all generations, backgrounds and abilities to work on the project and in turn bring new footfall and visitors to our Town to support the local businesses.

Westgate on Sea Town Council previously announced the biggest green space regeneration plan ever earlier in the year, the plan is being co-ordinated by Town Clerk Gill Gray and Vice Chairperson Cllr Robert Micallef and will take approximately three years to complete.

So far 150 trees and hedgerow plants have been planted that were sponsored by **OVO Energy**.

On 12th July **The Bumblebee Conservation Trust** who have taken on the sponsorship of the Westgate-on-Sea Train Station (their largest project to date) will launch the first planting at the station which will include wildlife attracting plants, herbs and the launch of an eat and grow garden. The Trust have also donated a large amount of Meadow Seeds and Poppy Seeds to the be planted across the town.



The bulk of this project will be completed using donations of plants, financial grants/donations and the local volunteers all of which we are open to receiving now.

# Westgate-on-Sea Town Council on the move

Westgate-on-Sea Town Council are pleased to announce that they are moving from their current premises at 11 Ethelbert Square, CT8 8SR to a new larger premise at 78 St Mildreds Road, CT8 8RF.

The move due to happen on 1st July will allow the council to expand its services, open for longer, have a more accessible location and provide additional community space. The new space formally Birchington Brides will be almost double the size of the current premises, which will allow Westgate-on-Sea Town Council to deliver more local services.

As well as being able to open longer hours each day, the new space will also house a Food Bank, Tourist Information Point, Ticket Office and Recycling Location.

Moving to 78 St Mildreds Road will also allow the council to move all meetings in house rather than paying to hold them in other locations which will provide a saving in their annual budget.

It is also hoped that the new space will be able to be a host location to many new communitybased services and classes building on the success they have had with things such as CPR & Defib Classes and Bumblebee Wildlife Training.

Westgate-on-Sea Town Council are also keen to start developing its own revenue streams to be able to put money back into community projects, as such the new space is hoped to be rented and used privately for exhibitions, events, gallery space, launches and community events which will not affect the day to day running of the council offices but will bring in additional revenue.

The move will not see any additional costs to residents.

Chairperson Martyn Pennington said, "The new premises not only offer good value for money but will be open to all the community as a facility".

This would involve something for everyone and we imagine multiple groups getting involved in setting up and running a fun fair, craft stalls, dog show, sports day races for children, cake baking competitions, flower displays, morris dancers, barber shop singers, traditional ice creams and cream teas. The possibilities are endless.

# WWRA: Our Bee Conservation Project

People who insist on having every blade of grass exactly the same length and swathes of earth where weeds are terrified to show there heads along with insects because they know they will be sprayed into instant extinction are, as the saying goes shoot themselves in the foot.

Research has shown that bees are very choosy as to which flower they will visit but insects are not. As long as there is a supply of nectar at the base of the bloom they will visit to feed thus brushing the pollen onto themselves which will brush off onto their next hosts stamen and fertilise it. So if the gardener leaves an adjacent area of untidy garden where they can dwell hidden away under a shrub etc. then not only will the gardener benefit from an increase in crop or flower yield insects and bees will have an undisturbed area to nest, hibernate and breed thus helping our endangered species. So those of you who have a garden like mine now have the perfect response to the tidy garden fanatics.

The plunge in numbers of bee species has many causes, some of the major causes are:

**Genetic over-breeding** where breeders are trying to breed the perfect honey gathering docile easily controllable bee. In doing so they have bred out the bees natural resistance to disease

Mega farming. This requires the removal of hedges and areas of trees and shrubs which in some cases contained unique small habitats of diverse species of bees and insects which had adapted to living in them.

Spraying of pesticides. Even in a very light breeze the fine spray of the pesticide can travel a considerable distance outside it's intended area and encroach on neighbouring habitats killing insects and bees etc. in these areas. In very small doses this can sometimes upset the biological balance within the bodies of the resident ecology.

To ensure crops are well fertilized honey bees are transported in numbers from one place to another and can actually deprive resident bees of sufficient foraging to maintain their numbers so the bee population in the area will decline.



Also these temporarily imported bees may carry diseases to which they have become resistant but he local native population has not.

#### How can we help?

Personally I am turning almost half of my lawn into a wildflower meadow and I also intend to grow bee friendly flowers and shrubs. I will also provide bee and insect nesting and hibernating sites where ever I can. Also I have been given a bee hotel by one of my grandchildren for Christmas so this can be screwed to the fence, these are easy to make and need not cost a great deal. I must also cut holes in the base of my fence panels to allow the passage of hedgehogs (should I be lucky enough to host any) from my garden into my neighbours to increase their foraging range.

When cutting a wildflower meadow it is essential to either collect all the ripened seed heads or allow the cut meadow grass to lay for a few days to allow the seeds to drop from their pods before collecting up the cuttings. In both cases it is essential to set the mower at its highest setting to preserve any nesting bee burrows.

What can we grow. Basically for bees you need to plan to have flowers and shrubs in flower all the year round. The type of flowers should be such that it allows the bees easy access to the carpels, which is surrounded by the stamens so the hybrids that have heads that look like up to four flowers all growing out of one stem are generally inaccessible to bees.

Winter. It is essential to have plants that bloom throughout the winter because if we have a warm spell bees can be roused from hibernation and will forage for food. I am lucky to have a shrub that starts blooming in the autumn and is in full bloom all winter and into spring with attractive yellow flowers. I believe it is of the pea family but I grew from a cutting obtained from a friend and he didn't know its name either.

Names such as winter jasmine, nemesia, heather, mahonia, Christmas Rose, violas, sweet alyssum, viburnum and clematis cirrhosis will all give you winter flowers.

Spring We can start with snowdrops, crocus, daffodils etc. plant once and walk away and forget them, Plant bluebells and they won't forget you and will increase each year (make sure you plant English bluebells not Spanish that are hybridising with our native variety and driving them to extinction.

Summer and autumn I can leave this to your imagination, anything that bares accessible blooms will be welcomed by our bizzy buzzy friends.

Shrubs loved by bees. Berberis have spring flowers and many have attractive leaves with bright coloured berries in autumn which will please your garden birds. St Johns Wort (Hypericum), Lavender, Hawthorn, Honeysuckle, the wild yellow honeysuckle is easy to grow from cuttings taken from the countryside hedgerows and lasts most of the summer and autumn. There are myriad others which you can look up on the internet.

Basically Support our bees, help them to increase in numbers to & pollinate our crops or you could choose to allow your descendants to starve to death because we don't have enough pollinators for our crops.

# New Games for Old Courts

For tennis enthusiasts there's nothing so depressing as walking past local authority tennis courts slowly disintegrating and under-used because of neglect.

For tennis enthusiasts there's nothing so depressing as walking past local authority tennis courts slowly disintegrating and under-used because of neglect.

Despite the intense public interest in the Wimbledon championships, councils often turn a blind eye to these public sports areas as they wrestle with the problems of providing muchneeded services with ever shrinking budgets. When a choice has to be made between care for children and older people or replacing cold hard asphalt, it is not difficult to understand what the outcome has to be.

Thanet council, with some of the most deprived areas in the south east, has its share of these problems. But there could be other ways to solve some of these dilemmas and provide extra cash for facilities that would otherwise be left at the back of the money queue.

The beginnings of an answer to the neglected spaces conundrum, could be provided by a small tennis group launched a few weeks ago at the St Mildred's Bay tennis courts, bordering Westgate in Westbrook Avenue. Every Sunday afternoon a group of players from beginners to more experienced players are meeting to learn, practice and compete with a view to one day forming what could become a multi-sports club. It's an ambitious concept that will need a good deal of effort, cooperation and planning and, not least of all, a large sum of money. How will this be possible?

Fortunately, there are examples of small groups that have been able to raise substantial amounts of cash through local donations, crowd funding, sponsorships, and grants from organisations like Sport England. For example three volunteers in Hingham, in Norfolk, were able to raise £91,000 in two and half years to renovate two derelict courts, provide floodlights and build a clubhouse now serving 200 members. For their efforts they received a "club of the year" award from the Lawn Tennis Association.



The courts at St Mildred's Bay could not be described as derelict but two courts could benefit from resurfacing and one court has back fencing missing at both ends. Two courts were resurfaced a few years ago through the generosity of a local councillor, according to one local resident.

To achieve results like those in Hingham a stepby-step approach will be needed. Starting at the end of April, the new tennis group has continued to grow and has been welcomed by officials at both Thanet and Westgate councils who a keen to promote health and fitness through activity on open spaces.

Assuming growth continues and there is agreement about forming a club, the next step would be to ask Thanet council to grant the club for a long-term lease which already happens in the case of local clubs like Margate and Broadstairs. A lease is important because grantgiving bodies need to be assured that money invested will be used for facilities available for use for years to come. Another reason is that a club needs to be able to allocate court time to members at designated times during the week. This is not say that the courts would be closed to members of the public who want to use the courts. Complimentary open-court sessions and free coaching would be available as a means of increasing members and promoting tennis generally.

One important question arises when considering the formation of a sports club and that is whether there will be enough members paying subscriptions to meet the expenditure on a lease, resurfacing courts in future years and other items like nets and other maintenance. Costing anything from £6,000-£,000 a year, raising this kind of sum by a small group would be difficult unless two courts became available for use by other sports. Fortunately, there are now tufted carpeted surfaces which now can be used for a variety of games like netball (growing fast since our Olympic success), basketball, football, cricket as well as tennis. So, given sufficient interest, it would be possible for a Westgate and Westbrook tennis group to morph into a multi-sports club.

Developing two-courts in this way would greatly widen the opportunities for both adults and children to engage in sports to their liking and provide the necessary income to maintain and develop a thriving sports club serving the local community.

One further hurdle would need to be cleared before this vision could become reality. Every club needs a clubhouse where equipment can be stored and members can shelter when a summer day turns wintry. A clubhouse can also provide an important focal point to social activities or just a place to relax with a cup of tea or coffee after a hard game.

One small step has been taken to achieving this ambitious project. If successful in the future, the view over the courts will give cause for optimism not gloom.

Westgate-on-Sea Town Council in conjunction with the British Heart Foundation Grant Scheme are pleased to announce that they have purchased another Defib machine which this time is to be placed at The Swan on Sea Road.

This Defibrillator machine forms part of the rolling training programme being done by local Community First Responders who demonstrate how easy it is to treat someone who has had a cardiac arrest or heart has stopped by using CPR or a Defibrillator. The monthly training being offered to the whole community has so far trained 50 residents and councillors.

So what is a Community First Responder (CFR)? – CFRs are volunteer members of their community who are trained to respond to emergency calls in conjunction with SECAMB. As they respond in the local areas where they live and work they are able to attend the scene of an emergency within a few minutes, and often before the emergency service arrives. They are able to offer life-saving first aid further increasing the patient's chances of survival.

SECAmb currently has more than 400 CFRs spread across Kent, Surrey and Sussex and north east Hampshire. CFRs attend roughly 20,000 emergency calls per year of which were categorised more than 10,000 are categorised as life-threatening including more than 1,000 of which are cardiac/respiratory arrest calls. A defibrillator is a device that gives a high energy electric shock to the heart through the chest wall to someone who is in cardiac arrest. This high energy shock is called defibrillation, and it's an essential life saving step in the chain of survival. If you come across someone who has had a cardiac arrest, it's vital to call 999 and start CPR. Then you should find out if there is a defibrillator nearby.

There are many defibrillators available in public places in Westgate-on-Sea such as Westgate Surgery, My Dentist, Edwards, The Bake & Alehouse, King Ethelbert School, St Saviours Church of England Junior School and the Fire station.

You shouldn't be afraid of using a defibrillator if someone has had a cardiac arrest, the machines have built in vocal instructions and only works on the patient if needed. Come and find out more on our 90 minute training course.

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#### **RASPBERRY RIPPLE ICE CREAM**

10

#### **INGREDIENTS**

250g raspberries 225g caster sugar 2 large eggs 4 egg yolks 600ml double cream

Raspberries or other fruit for serving



#### **METHOD**

Place the raspberries in a pan with 2 tbsp of the sugar. Cook on a medium heat until sugar dissolves into the pulp. Simmer for 5 mins until thickened, then push the pulp through a sieve into a bowl and discard the seeds.

Place the eggs, egg yolks and remaining sugar into a bowl. Whisk with an electric whisk hand whisk to combine everything, then place over a pan of gently simmering water - the bowl should not touch the water. Beat with the electric whisk for 3-4 mins until thick and pale. Remove from heat and continue beating with the whisk until cool.

In another bowl, whisk the cream until it forms soft peaks, then gently fold into the cool egg mix until just combined. Pour the mix into a shallow container or dish that can be frozen. Just before you freeze the mixture gently swirl the raspberry puree through, cover with cling film and freeze for at least 6 hrs. Remove from the freezer about 20 minutes before serving. Place scoops of the ice cream into bowls with extra raspberries or other fruit. It's also aoraeous in cones.





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
